New senior years review

Under National Schools Reform Agreements with states and territories, the Australian Government has formed an expert panel to oversee the *Review into Senior Secondary Education*. The panel, chaired by <u>Professor Peter Shergold AC</u>, will provide advice to the Education Council of the skills and knowledge needed for the world beyond school.

<u>Consultations will be held across Australia</u> until November and submissions are now open. A final report is due to the Education Council in June 2020. The panel is

keen to hear from teachers, parents, industry, employers, vocational and higher education sectors and most importantly young people.
