

Hon DAN TEHAN MP - Minister for Education

The Hon Dan Tehan MP is the Member for Wannon in Victoria. He is Minister for Education and was sworn in on 28 August 2018.

Mr Tehan served as Minister for Social Services from 20 December 2017. Prior to this, he was the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Minister for Defence Personnel, Minister Assisting the Prime Minister for Cyber Security and Minister Assisting the Prime Minister for the Centenary of Anzac.

Mr Tehan was elected to Federal Parliament in 2010 and has held positions as the Chair of the Parliamentary Joint Committee on Intelligence and Security; Chair of the Victorian Consultative Panel for the Black Spot Programme;

Chair of the Coalition Policy Committee on Economics and Finance; Co-Chair of the Parliamentarians Supporting Cancer Causes; Co-Chair of the Parliamentary Friends of Youth Mental Health, and; Chair of the Coalition Friends of Tourism.

Prior to entering Parliament, Mr Tehan worked in agriculture in Australia and overseas. He has worked in the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade where he held various roles, including as a diplomat at the Australian Embassy in Mexico. Mr Tehan worked at senior levels of the Australian Government, including as a Senior Adviser to the Deputy Prime Minister and Chief of Staff to the Minister for Small Business and Tourism. He also worked as the Director of Trade Policy and International Affairs at the Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry and as Deputy State Director for the Victorian Liberal Party.

Mr Tehan has Masters Degrees in International Relations and Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Mr Tehan is married and lives in Hamilton. He is a passionate supporter of the Richmond Football Club and enjoys spending time outdoors with his family.

In addition, Brian holds the positions of State President of the Queensland Association of Combined Sector Leaders (QACSL) and President of

He worked as a teachers' aide at the Normanton State School and Secondary Department (now known as Normanton P-10 State School) while he completed senior through the Secondary Correspondence School (now known as the Brisbane School of Distance Education). He also taught at the Isis District State High School before becoming Head of Department (English) at Mirani State High School. He then became Deputy Principal at Sarina State High School before taking up the principalship at Calen.

Brian has a Master of Learning Management from CQUniversity and last year was awarded a Companion of the University in recognition of his long term support of the institution and its programs. He intends to commence his doctorate with Flinders University in 2020.

Brian is the author of three books – A Unique School in the Gulf; Taming the Isis; and Education on the Baffle.

AGPPA's core focus is to provide a unified voice to promote and advocate for government primary principals and schools within Australia representing over 5,300 government primary schools.


