The Australian Curriculum: public consultation opens

The Foundation to Year 10 Australian Curriculum is our national curriculum which outlines the core content that all young people should be taught regardless of where they live in Australia.

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) reviews the curriculum every six years and has consulted with 360 practising teachers and curriculum specialists to develop the proposed changes.

There are proposed changes across the whole of the curriculum including all eight learning areas with the aim of making the content clearer and better organised. It also more concise, more specific and less cluttered.

The proposals are not final but are now open to public consultation and feedback until 8 July. The feedback will be used to develop final revisions, which will be provided to federal, state and territory education ministers for their consideration.

With the rapid pace of technological change, there was a need to update the Australian Curriculum: Technologies to ensure students develop contemporary knowledge, understanding and skills. In the proposed revisions, outdated and non-essential content has been removed and new content added to give teachers clarity and guidance about what they are expected to teach.



Through making and responding to arts works, students develop creativity and critical thinking, and through engaging with the worlds of artists, arts works, audiences and arts professions, they gain a deeper understanding of local, regional and global cultures.

What is the Australian Curriculum?

 The Foundation – Year 10 Australian Curriculum outlines the core knowledge and skills to be taught to all Australian students. It sets consistent expectations for what every student should learn and to the standard of that learning. The national curriculum was introduced to improve the quality, equity and transparency of Australia's education system.

Are teachers involved in the Review?

• The views and experiences of teachers are key to the review process. Around 360 teachers and curriculum experts from across the country have been involved in 18 new reference groups ACARA established specifically to inform the Review.

What are core concepts?

• Core concepts are the big ideas, understandings, skills or processes that are central to a learning area. They anchor a coherent curriculum and give clarity and direction about what matters.

Who can provide feedback on the revised Australian Curriculum?


• This is a public consultation – anyone can provide feedback. Feedback will help us ensure the Australian Curriculum remains world class and meets the needs of students.

The three dimensions of the Australian Curriculum

The three dimensions (learning areas, general capabilities and cross-curriculum priorities) provide teachers with the flexibility to cater for student diversity through personalised learning. Teachers can meet individual learning needs by incorporating explicit teaching of the general capabilities and/or cross-curriculum priorities through learning area content.
